.....SOME MENTAL HEALTH FACTS AND FIGURES

1 in 4 people will suffer some form of mental health problem during the course of their lives (*Royal College of Psychiatrists*)

Individuals with serious mental illness (SMI) have a reduced life expectancy of approximately 10 -25 years compared to the general population *(de Hert et al 2011)*

By 2030 mental health problems (particularly depression) will be the leading cause of mortality and morbidity globally (*The World Health Organisation*)

Living alone, compared to living with others, increases the risk of depression by 42% (*Wu and others 2022*)

Individuals who are socially isolated are between two and five times more likely than those who have strong social ties to die prematurely *(Marmot Review 2010)*

.....AND IN COUNTY DURHAM (CIRCA 520K POPULATION)

There are over 4,600 people registered with GP's with a diagnosis of mental illness*

148,000+ people live in poverty, around29% of the population**

51,000+ have a common mental disorder,e.g. anxiety and depression**

23,000+ with 2 or more psychiatric disorders, e.g. schizophrenia and bi-polar**

1,300+ hospital stays for self harm**

Between 2019 and 2021 the suicide rate was significantly higher (15.8) than the England average (10.4) per 100,000 population***

.....AND THE LINK TO SOCIAL ISOLATION AND LONLINESS

Around 19% of County Durham's population is aged 65+**

Around 20% of County Durham's older population are 'mildly lonely', 11% are 'intensely lonely'**

Public Health England estimates that 7% of the 18-64 population is socially isolated, for Co Durham this is around 22,000 people**
